THE RHODO GARDEN

After 12 to 18 months, I'm still learning what it takes to look after our garden. But with so many dedicated and knowledgeable people to help, it becomes a labour of love. Especially with all the positive comments from so many people who walk along the paths every day.

Over the last 12 months we had 8 work party's with a total of 73 helpers attending up to 2hr each time. Not to forget the social get-together, with coffee and some delicious goodies (after work).

Spring started with weeding, spreading mulch, about 20 yards, also some gravel for the walkways and fertilizing and continued over the next months with weeding, pruning and everybody's favourite, deadheading. Some poor plants were taken out and some just moved to better locations.

The parks board solved some of our problems by pruning some of the big trees for more light, and providing extra watering during a very dry summer.

Many discussions took place throughout the season regarding a few spots that needed filling.

One possibility was to add 2 to 3 medium size trees and just recently we did add a Gingko and a Liquid Amber. We have also continued to raise the bricks along the paths and the labeling of each rhodo in the garden. Plans are proceeding to have a sign in each of our 7 beds which will allow easier identification of our rhododendrons.

The large wooden sign was seriously showing the results of exposure to west coast weather and was recently re-painted and will be back in the garden shortly.

All this work should ensure that the CVRG looks at its best for the 20th Anniversary celebration of the Rhodo Garden in May 2017. Hopefully, the original organizers will be proud of what they created and will be happy knowing that it is still in good hands.

Thanks should go to the whole of this chapter for the support and all the eager helpers every month.

Our next work party will be May 5th 9AM to finish mulching and fertilizing. This work party will be one week earlier than normal so the garden will look good for Mother's Day.

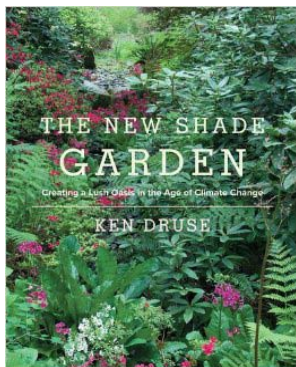
Last month we ran the following:

“The New Shade Garden: Creating a Lush Oasis in the Age of Climate Change”

There is a new generation of gardeners who are planting gardens not only for their visual beauty but also for their ability to reduce carbon dioxide in the atmosphere. In *The New Shade Garden*, Ken Druse provides this generation with a comprehensive guide to creating a shade garden with an emphasis on the adjustments necessary for our changing climate.

Ken Druse is the author of more than a dozen award-winning gardening books, including *Natural Companions* and *Making More Plants*. His work is also featured in the *New York Times* and *Martha Stewart Living*. He currently resides in New Jersey.

Druse offers advice for common problems facing today's gardeners, from addressing the deer situation to watering plants without stressing limited resources. Detailing all aspects of the gardening process, the book covers basic topics such as designing your own garden, pruning trees, preparing soil for planting, and the vast array of flowers and greenery that grow best in the shade. Perfect for new and seasoned gardeners alike, this wide-ranging encyclopedic manual provides all the information you need to start or improve upon your own shade garden.

As you take a closer look at this delicately beautiful flower, I think you'll understand when I say, "I'm in love with Rhododendron 'Electra'". All R. augustinii are beautiful but this cross of the ssp chasmanum and ssp augustinii really does seem exceptional. The ARS site describes her as "violet blue, paler in the throat, with a narrow ray of olive green markings on a white ground". They say she grows 5 feet in 10 years which is faster growing than me. Took me 14 years, I think. As much as I hate to share her, I think you should go a-courting, also.
