'**Isola Bella**' 5', -21C. Funnel shaped flowers opening very pale purple and aging to yellowish-white with faint pink blush at lobe centres and faint yellow to green spotting.

### OUR DOOR PRIZE IS:

**R. oreotrephes** 5', -18C. Prolific flowering species, upright and compact. Bell shaped flowers range in colour from mauve to mauve-pink. A striking glaucous cast occurs on the foliage, stems and buds.

# VISITORS FROM NORWAY

On Monday, March 11<sup>th</sup>, Garth Wedemire and Sue Grant met our special guests Ole Jonny Larsen and his wife, Kari, who travelled all the way from their home in Ålesund, Norway. Meeting them at the Nanaimo ferry, Garth & Sue escorted them to our beautiful Comox Valley where they graciously hosted them for two nights.

Jonny is a retired teacher from a Norwegian state school. In his retired life he's an addicted collector of plants, admitting that his favourites are Rhododendron species. He is the President of the Norwegian Rhododendron Society and has one of Norway's biggest private collections of the genus.

Since the Larsen's were here a day in advance of our meeting date, we had the opportunity to show them some of the beauty around our communities during the day.

Our tour began on a crisp and clear Tuesday morning, meeting at the crevice gardens in the Comox Marina Park. NIRS member Dany Fortin, an employee with the Comox Parks Department, explained the process of building the two crevice garden areas and some of the alpine plants they contain. He also showed them some of the many other unusual trees growing around the park.



Dany and several other NIRS members then travelled to the Filberg Park for a tour of the gardens. Although the gardens were dormant for the season, Jonny & Kari could see their potential and some of the unusual plants they contain. They were also able to enjoy some of the spectacular views across to Goose Spit and the Beaufort Mountain Range.



A scenic drive through the Town of Comox, crossing the 17<sup>th</sup> Street Bridge led us to showcase our own Comox Valley Rhododendron Garden. It was then across to the White Spot restaurant on Cliffe Avenue for an enjoyable lunch and visit.

Following lunch, Noni & Dave Godfrey toured the Larsens through downtown Courtenay, crossing the historic 5<sup>th</sup> Street Bridge and up Ryan Road. At the top of Ryan Road, we showed them the Air

Force base, the RCAF Heritage Museum's Air Park and the Civilian Air Terminal. We then drove around to Kye Bay where they were treated to a spectacular view of the mainland's coastal mountains.

Passing Point Holmes on the way back to the Wedemire home, Jonny & Kari were once again in awe of all the beauty that surrounds our communities.



Back at the house, it was time for them to rest up and take a nap before joining several club members for a pre-meeting dinner.



That evening, at the standing room only meeting, Jonny gave his presentation on his experiences as an amateur plant hunter in the Himalayas. As a bonus, Jonny also told the history of Jean Rasmussen, known primarily as the wife of the great plant hunter Frank Kingdon-Ward, and her connection to Norway. Both were very informative presentations.

We were pleased for the opportunity to host such a prestigious guest speaker as Ole Jonny Larsen; as were the other District 1 chapters. We wished them well and invited them to return another year - during the blooming season.

## THE RHODO IN THE BANNER

### R. 'BUTTER BRICKLE'

There comes a time in life when you just get tired of that ever-dependable "little black dress" and reach out for something a little more daring. Maybe the red strapless number showing a little too much leg? Then in the world of rhododendrons you're ready for a Lofthouse. Something frilly and full of colour. Why not try on R. 'Butter Brickle'?

The predominantly funnel-shaped frilly flowers have light yellow edges which darken to brilliant yellow towards the centre, with 1/2" star-shaped vivid red blotching in the throat and spotting. This really is a beautiful compact plant, but with Hotei and Lem's Cameo as parents what can you expect? Growing to 3 feet and hardy to -18 deg C and showing new bronze-coloured growth, this and many more Lofthouse rhododendrons should be considered for your garden wardrobe.
