R. 'Hallelujah'

Growth Habit: large (5 x 5 feet), zone 4b, colour red, filtered to full sun, blooms in May. Bright rose-red trusses are densely packed on a bed of deep forest green leaves. The leaves have a mid-rib crease and are pointed, creating a unique visual show after the flowering season ends. A year-round beauty. (Can see more on page 139 in Greer book).



R. 'Midsummer'

(Thanks to Garth Wedemire for this donation)

Colour is Pink, not fragrant, compact truss of about 13 flowers, late bloomer, height 5 feet in 10 years, good to -23°C



R. 'Buttermint'

Predominate flower colour is yellow, not fragrant, blooms in midseason, 3" long medium green leaves, dense and compact, best grown in some shade, grows 3 feet in 10 years, cold hardy to -21°C. (Can see more on page 106 in Greer book).

Member Profile

Kathy Haigh is feeling rather awkward writing a profile about herself, but the inquiring minds of some NIRS members felt it was time to know her better, so here goes.

Growing up Kathy saw herself as the classic prairie girl who was fascinated by oceans. She was born and raised in central Alberta and lived briefly in Edmonton, and for decades in Calgary and Cochrane. There was a two-year break from sub-zero winters when her family moved to Katy, Texas for her then-husband's job. Upon returning to the deep freeze, they decided to investigate retirement in a warmer Canadian climate. And so, once their children (now 27 and 25) were set up away at university they moved to Comox.



Kathy's education and career unfolded in an unconventional order. Immediately following high school she worked as a reservations sales agent at Wardair Canada (with computers but before the internet!) and took advantage of great travel opportunities. Then she worked at Alberta Liquor Control Board stores and head office, on the management track, which came to an end after the fallout of a nasty labour strike. By this time Kathy had been married a few years and decided to get a Business Diploma from Mount Royal College. After working for a human resources consulting firm for a bit, she pursued a Communications Studies Degree at the University of Calgary. Kathy was not only a "mature student" but she also was pregnant twice while at university. Devastatingly, her first baby died of SIDS. But she continued on her path and the next baby was born three months after convocation. After some infant health issues, and a third baby, Kathy decided that she would be a "stay at home" mother for her son and daughter. However, she engaged in several community, school and social service-types of volunteer endeavours over the next twenty years.

Shortly after moving to the Comox Valley in 2015 from Calgary, Kathy joined the Newcomers' Club which was a very efficient way to meet folks, learn about the community and participate in activities of all sorts. At one of the meetings, the guest speaker was a Project Watershed biologist who spoke about the environmental work they were doing. Kathy was intrigued by the organization's positive and action-oriented mission and soon after began volunteering at fundraising and outreach events, promoting the local work on near-shore and shoreline ecosystems. She became a Project Watershed Director in 2016 and put her fundraising, communications and business skills to work as the Kus-kus-sum project kicked off. She is currently the Chair of the Board of Directors and considers herself a late-blooming environmentalist - still volunteering her time to worthy causes.

Almost exactly three years after moving to Comox, Kathy separated from her husband (don't get her started on why!), went travelling to be with family, returned and bought her own home in Courtenay in 2019. Kathy transformed her yard from the standard lawn with one prominent tree and a peripheral flower bed to a more natural, drought-tolerant and varied landscape. With the

design assistance of Karen Cummins and a few other hired contractors, both the front and back yard were redone to eliminate lawns and create a multi-season habitat for pollinators while growing food crops as well as beautiful flowers and shrubs. Sticking with the design concept of never using a straight line if a curved line works, the vegetable beds are uniquely key-hole-shaped - just one of many ideas learned in a permaculture course. Likewise, the curved flag-stone path and curvy wrought-iron gate lend an informal tone. This outdoor renovation began in March 2020, which mostly was good timing as Kathy met many neighbours who were walking by getting their Covid-era fresh air and exercise while she was doing the same working in her yard. She now has twelve rhodos - acquired from NIRS draws and sales all of which are small but growing nicely.

Now happily divorced and loving her independence, she enjoys spending time in nature and has taken to eco-tourism. Last August she went on a "safari" at Seal River, MB to see polar bears and beluga whales, and this past September she went to BC's Great Bear Rainforest on a sailing ship and saw numerous grizzly bears and whales and a plethora of sea life.

As an active member of the Comox Paddlers' Club, Kathy frequently takes her sea kayak out on day trips near home with friends. A few times a year she goes on adventures from other Vancouver Is. locations and to other islands (Quadra, Cortes, Spring, Cormorant, Malcolm) and/or lodge destinations (Broken Islands, Discovery Is.) and/or ship-based kayaking (Columbia III in the Broughton Archipelago). She really enjoys being on the water and watching for wildlife.

Kathy has been a member of NIRS for five years, learning much about the iconic west coast spring blooms, and is editor of the *Rhodoteller*.
