Plant of the Month

Rhododendron x planetum

Here is an interesting and little-known species rhododendron that is considered a natural hybrid, that is why there is a small "X" in front of the name, signifying a cross. It was discovered growing in south central China.

Information on this plant is limited. One reputable site says it is a cross between R. sutchuenense and R. oreodoxa and listed under subsection Fortunea. Another site says it is probably a hybrid of R. decorum.

What I can say about it, is that it's a fine plant. It buds up reliably, has compact upright growing habit and can take full sun. The dull green elliptical leaves have no tomentum or indumentum.

R. planetum flowers here in early to mid April with lax trusses of approximately 10-12 light pink flowers. It isn't a fast grower, approximately 3-4" a year, but will be taller than 6 feet high eventually, from images I have seen. It is hardy to at least -20°C, as both parents are that hardy. It does show some nice colouring of young branch stems as seen in the photo below.

Unfortunately, this plant isn't available by any growers that I know of. My plant was purchased from Harold Fearing, who grew it from seed he got from the ARS seed exchange.
