FYI – Proper format for writing Rhododendron Names

I have never been sure how to properly write the names of the rhododendrons. I did some research and found some very specific International Code of Nomenclature for Plants. I thought all the details were a little overwhelming so took the liberty of giving you a boiled down version.

General Rules for Scientific Names

- **Italicization/Underlining:** All scientific names (genus, species, variety, etc.) must be in *italics* when typed or underlined when handwritten.
- **Capitalization:**
 - The **genus name** is always capitalized (e.g., *Rhododendron*).
 - The **species name** is never capitalized, even if it refers to a person or place (e.g., *Rhododendron catawbiense*, not *Rhododendron Catawbiense*).

Rules for Cultivated Plants (Hybrids and Cultivars)

Cultivated plant names have specific formatting rules different from botanical names.

- **Cultivar Names:**
 - Cultivar names are not italicized.
 - They are enclosed in **single quotation marks** (never double quotes).
 - Each word within the cultivar name is capitalized (except for conjunctions, prepositions, etc.).
 - The cultivar name follows the species name or genus name:
 - *Rhododendron catawbiense 'Album Elegans'*
- **Hybrids:**
 - Hybrids between two species are indicated by a multiplication sign (×).

Rhododendron 'George Budgen'

R. 'George Budgen' is prized among vireya enthusiasts for its vivid tropical coloration and relatively small, manageable size. Compact shrub, reaching about 0.8 × 0.35 m in 4 years. It is known for its striking golden-yellow to orange funnel-shaped flowers and compact growth habit. Come and see the flower buds it is already displaying.



Step-by-Step Guide for Comox Valley

Location & Protection

Outdoors: Only in frost-free microclimates (e.g., sheltered courtyards, south-facing walls).

Indoors/Greenhouse: Best option. A cool greenhouse or sunroom with good airflow mimics their native tropical highland habitat.

Winter: Must be protected from frost. Minimum safe temperature: ~10 °C.

Rhododendron 'Cream Glory'



Size: 3–5 ft tall and wide — ideal for borders or woodland gardens.

Flowers: Cream-colored clusters in spring, attractive to pollinators like bees.

Foliage: Glossy green leaves, year-round interest.

Resistances: Deer, rabbit, and verticillium wilt resistant.

Zones: USDA 6b–10a — suitable for mild coastal BC gardens with protection.

Sunlight: Prefers dappled shade or partial sun.

Rhododendron 'Tara Too'

This beautiful unregistered rhododendron hybrid, has made its way into few people's gardens, that is, if they shopped at Hidden Acres Rhododendrons. This is one of Lofthouse hybrid seedlings, that the late Paul Wurz inherited and grew, and named after his daughter Tara. He also named another hybrid rhododendron after his daughter called *Rhododendron Taralynn'*, which I'll write about at a later date. Neither of these rhododendrons, were ever registered with the ARS.

What I can tell you about *R. 'Tara Too'* is that it's a beautiful foliage plant when exhibiting its new growth, as seen in the photo.



The new leaves open a brighter maroon colour, then they darken to a bronze colour as seen in the photo, and then they gradually transition to green. The leaf petiole is a bright green, which contrasts attractively with the darker matte green leaves.

I never managed to get a flower photo of my plant, so my friend Alan Campbell, provided photo of his plant in flower. Thank you for that Alan. Information on this plant is non-existent, so I can only share my observations.

The plant forms trusses of 8-12 flowers, which are pink with pale yellow throat, giving them a bit of an orange hue. The new growth is about 3-4 inches a year, and the plant is expected to be about 3 feet high in 10 years, however it tends to spread more than grow upright, and I estimate about five feet wide in the same 10 years.



It's perfectly hardy here in Fanny Bay, as well as Campbell River, so its hardiness is probably good to -18°C.

This plant can take sun, as I saw at the nursery that grew it, but mine gets mostly high shade.

Since there are no business sources for this plant, the only way to get this one, is from the various private propagation enterprises on the island.
